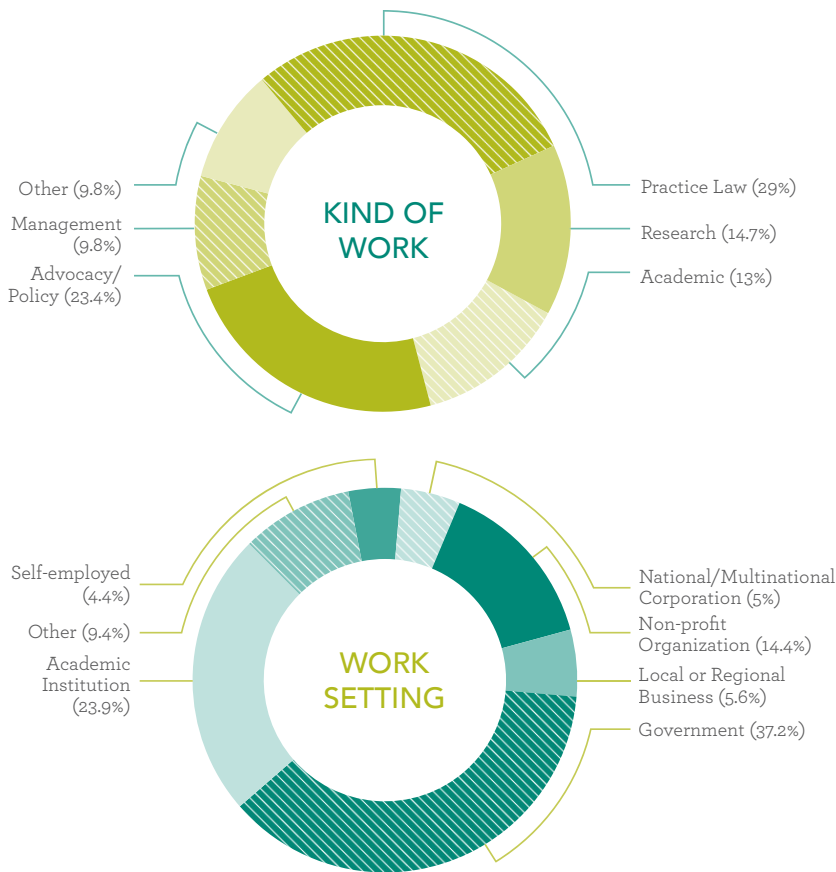


J.D./M.P.H. Survey Summary

INTRODUCTION

To learn more about the academic and professional experiences of individuals with a Juris Doctor (J.D.) and a Master of Public Health (M.P.H.), the Network for Public Health Law conducted an informal survey of people in the field. 211 individuals with a J.D. and M.P.H. responded. Approximately 75% of the respondents are female and 25% male. Over half of respondents indicated that they are between the ages of 21 and 39.

CURRENT CAREER EXPERIENCE

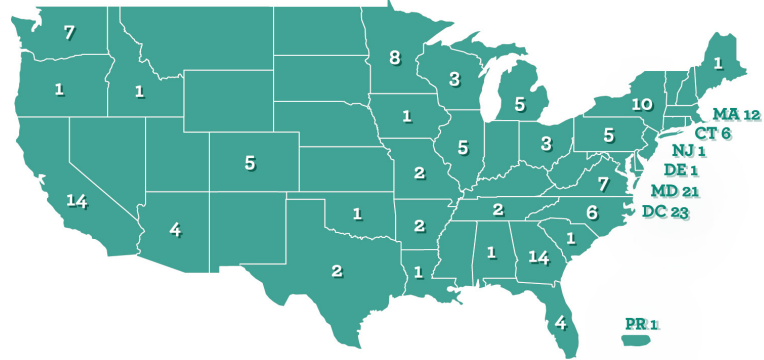


CAREER STAGE

- 56.4%** of the survey respondents are in the early-career stage (25+ years before planned retirement)
- 26.1%** are in the mid-career stage (10-24 years before planned retirement)
- 17.6%** are in the late-career stage (less than 10 years before planned retirement)

CURRENT STATE/TERRITORY OF RESIDENCE



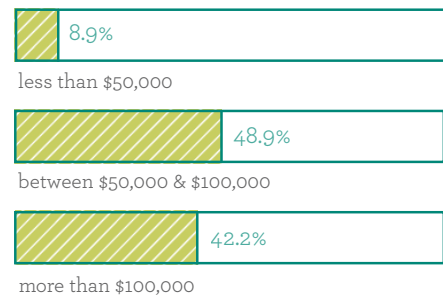
ACADEMIC EXPERIENCE

The majority of survey respondents did not complete their J.D./M.P.H. concurrently (69% vs. 31%).

Those who completed a concurrent J.D./M.P.H. program did so because it provided a streamlined approach to coursework, allowing them to finish in a shorter period of time and save money.

Of those who did not complete a concurrent J.D./M.P.H. program, many indicated that they returned to school to obtain the second degree (either J.D. or M.P.H.) because of personal interest. Enhanced career opportunities was another factor cited by respondents.
