


Native Hawaiians are the indigenous people of the Hawaiian Archipelago



Cancer Statistics

> 6,000+ new cancer cases each year in Hawai`i

Native Hawaiians have higher mortality rates than other ethnic groups in Hawai`i.

Patient Navigation

NCI definition:

Assistance offered to healthcare consumers (patients, survivors, families, and caregivers) to help them access and then chart a course through the healthcare system and overcome any barriers to quality care.

Patients and families experience "access" and "systems" barriers


Access Barriers

- High costs
- No insurance
- Few providers and services on island
- Distance to care
- Too busy to seek care
- Stressed or limited support system

Systems Barriers

- Need to run around between
 providers, offices, and facilities
- Lost referrals and paperwork
- Not knowing who is in charge
- Not knowing what to ask
- · Feeling intimidated
- Providers' lack of sensitivity, time to answer questions, or knowledge of resources

Cancer care is complicated.




People with cancer need community-based AND clinical-based assistance.

Comments from COS Navigators

- The connection with Andrea at Queen's Hospital has been invaluable. I know her and can refer my patients to her.
- The ACS people helped too by getting a grant for the family to stay at Manamana for a week.
- Now I know to link patients to Malama Kou Kino for counseling, a \$200 stipend, a phone card, and resource list.
- The Ke Ola Mamo worker in Honolulu met my patient at the airport and took her to Kuakini for treatment.
- I didn't know about that type of cancer, but I helped her look on the Web and then call CIS.

Lessons Learned



Contacts are critical.

You can't learn everything, but you can "learn how to learn."

Curriculum is best offered as a supplement to basic CHW training; assessment and case management are essential to navigation.

Navigators need on-going CE sessions and opportunities to share cases.

CHWs can do it.

Partners are critical to training and navigation programs if community-based navigators are to get their patients into and through care.
