
Most Mexicans in New York City come from the State of Puebla...

....located slightly over 110 km south-east of Mexico City






Fastest Growing Ethnic Minority Group in NYC

New York City has one of the highest AIDS case rates in the US




The NYC AIDS case rate is more than 3 times the US average and 45 times the Healthy People 2010 target.

HIV diagnoses per 100,000 in 2005



HIV/AIDS is concentrated in the poorest neighborhoods (South Bronx, Central Brooklyn, Harlem) and also in lower Manhattan.

"Jose" - more than 10 female sexual partners of multiple ethnicities n = 4


"Jose" - 1-9 female sexual partners Mexican or Latina n = 33

"Luis" multiple male sexual partners of multiple ethnicities n = 2



























Methods:

- Life Histories (n =10)


