How big is the problem?

> 750,000 uninsured in Tennessee
 (12.7% of population = 766,928)

> 50,000 uninsured in Nashville (12.7% of population = 76,200)



Why are people uninsured?


- Group coverage unavailable through employment
- Cannot afford premiums
- Uninsurable for medical reasons
- Affects all income categories
- Undocumented residents



- Less preventive care, less therapeutic care, higher mortality
- Inappropriate use of hospital emergency departments
- Growing uncompensated care at hospitals

Safety Net Consortium of Middle Tennessee

- Formed May 2000
- Composed of all Nashville hospitals and clinics that serve the uninsured on a sliding fee scale
- Board of Directors and two Advisory Boards – Nashville and Behavioral Health
- Health Department is managing partner



Bridges to Care

- <u>Links</u> uninsured persons to a health clinic that lowers their normal charge for low-income persons
- Provides help with some <u>prescription</u> <u>medications</u>, patients pay \$7
- Provides help with <u>transportation</u>



Requirements to Enroll

- Must not have health insurance.
- Must live in Davidson County.
- Must provide documentation of family income.
- Must sign a release of information statement.



Care Coordination

- Catholic Charities of Tennessee provides care coordination.
- Care Coordinators are located where uninsured persons are likely to be – hospital ERs, health department clinics, DHS, etc.
- Primary function is to link the uninsured person to a safety net provider.



Pharmacy Services

- Prescriptions for BTC enrollees are filled at Lentz PHC and General Hospital.
- \$7 co-payment per prescription per month.
- Co-payment waived for the homeless.



Transportation Services

- Care Coordinator screens BTC enrollee during the initial enrollment session to determine if they are eligible.
- Transport only to Consortium clinics and BTC Plus Doctors.
- Health Department schedules trip.
- Bus pass mailed to enrollee.

Bridges to Care Results

More than 40,500 uninsured residents of Nashville have been linked to a medical home since the inception of the program in February 2002.



Enrollee Characteristics

- 42% are employed, 37% more than 20 hrs.
- 94% have incomes below 200% poverty
- 61% white, 36% black, 3% other
- 28% born in another country, 17% Mexico
- 25% are Hispanic
- 14% homeless
- 11% cannot read



Bridges to Care Results

More than <u>168,000</u> prescriptions have been filled for BTC enrollees at the Lentz and MNGH pharmacies. <u>\$2,540,000</u>



Bridges to Care Results


More than <u>6,000</u> free, round trip transports to medical services have been provided.





How it Works

- BTC enrollees with income below 200% of poverty are eligible.
- Managed by Nashville Academy of Medicine.
- Specialists see BTC patients referred by a doctor at a Safety Net Clinic for a \$10 charge per visit.
- Hospitals provide services upon the request of the BTC Plus participating physician.
- Kroger fills prescriptions, \$5 co-pay.




Results

- 6,224 patient slots as of August, 2007
- 578 physicians participating
- More than 1,489 patients served
- 4,333 physician patient visits
- 648 diagnostic tests
- 241 outpatient surgeries
- 177 inpatient days




\$ Value of Services Provided

Behavioral Health

- Nashville has an estimated 16-18,000 uninsured residents in need of mental health or substance abuse treatment.
- Current capacity is severely inadequate to meet the needs of the target population



The Goal

- Develop a coordinated system of volunteer behavioral health providers
- All private and public mental health, substance abuse, and alternative therapy providers are being invited to join the network


The Goal

- Recruit as many as 500 volunteer behavioral health providers in the first year
- Link at least 100 uninsured and underinsured financially needy persons to care in first year


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Annual Operating Budget
