

## Public Health Prevails Over Preemption in South Carolina:

- Heavy emphasis politically and financially on tobacco growing

- Preemption on the books (SC Code of Laws 16-17-504)

- Significantly below CDC recommendations for prevention funding
- Lowest cigarette tax in the United States (7 cents)
- "Voluntary" policy until 2006







The city of Beaufort is considering a comprehensive smoke-free workplace ordinance to include restaurants and bars.

Beaufort County, Hilton Head Island, Bluffton, Charleston, Sullivan's Island, Columbia, Greenville, Aiken County and Liberty recently passed smoke-free workplace ordinances. Statewide, towns and cities are recognizing their responsibility to protect citizens from secondhand smoke exposure in the workplace. Newberry and Clemson also are engaged in active campaigns for smoke-free workplace ordinances.

Beaufort City Council will hold a public hearing on this issue at 6 p.m. Tuesday, March 13 in Council Chambers of the County Government Complex, 100 Ribaut Road, Beaufort.

#### Guidance from Surgeon General's Report Welcomed

COLUMBIA - Today's release of a U.S. Surgeon General's report on involuntary exposure to tobacco smoke stresses the need for continued work to reduce health risks from secondhand smoke in South Carolina and the rest of the nation, the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control reported today.

"The details in the surgeon general's report offer guidance in our continuing work to insure all South Carolinians breathe clean air," said Hellen Dekle, secondhand smoke policy prevention coordinator in DHEC's Division of Tobacco Prevention and Control. "We are working with schools, hospitals, faith-based groups, worksites and recreation facilities in an effort to reduce secondhand smoke exposure among children and adults."




## **Failed Approaches**

   Can find work elsewhere.




#### S.C. Municipalities with Smoke-Free Workplace Ordinances
