


Overview of the ACEs

- Funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- Ten ACEs (including two Urban Partnership Academic Centers of Excellence - UPACEs)
- Unique from traditional research centers in their University-Community partnership to study and create lasting ways to prevent youth violence
- Support dissemination and translation of youth violence prevention research into effective community practices


 Mobilize parents to address youth violence using the Voices Against Violence video curriculum to promote bystander pro-social reaction to youth violence







The Expressive Writing Study

- An intervention designed for middle-school youth exposed to community violence
- Preliminary results have yielded promising findings
 - relative to students in the standard expressive writing condition, students in the control condition had higher levels of emotional lability (lack of emotional control) and higher levels of aggressive behavior and anxiousdepressive symptoms
 - students with high levels of community violence exposure appeared to benefit most from the expressive writing intervention



Project COPE

- Focuses on stressors in the lives of youth living in impoverished areas and how linked to adjustment
- Urban youths interviewed to relive recent stressful situation involving violence
- Preliminary results
 - Adolescent relational and physical aggression differentially associated with emotional awareness and emotion regulation coping
 - Youth who mentioned revenge as a goal evoked from violent situations had a strong positive association between witnessing violence and caregiver-rated externalizing behavior problems



ACE Coordinating Center


- Coordinating Center established to initiate, foster & support coordinated efforts among the ACEs
- Taking lead on National ACE Action Plan
- Also look to partner with others in moving forward national agenda for youth violence prevention
 - Collaboration with UNITY, Urban Networks to Increase Thriving Youth through Violence Prevention, another CDCfunded initiative
 - Begin to find ways in which ACEs and UNITY can work together to advance youth violence prevention in cities as well as nationally



ACE – UNITY Collaboration

ACEs

emphasizes the partnership with and evaluation of community-based violence prevention initiatives



UNITY

strategy and communication to support cities in establishing infrastructure for effective youth violence prevention efforts

- ACEs' research can inform UNITY's work to identify and disseminate best and promising practices and approaches to preventing youth violence in cities
- UNITY's work can inform ACE activities and the direction of the CC as the projects partner to develop a national strategy for youth violence prevention



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
