




Audience Survey

- How many of you worked in Aceh, Indonesia?



2005 Aceh Status

- 29 years of conflict
- 130,000 dead
- 300,000 displaced
- 65,000 housed in temporary living centers





January 2007 Status

- Peace agreement
- 2 year barrack land leases ending
- Physical conditions deteriorating





Survey Aim

- Quantify the water and sanitation situation in temporary barracks
- Evaluate the hygiene knowledge, attitudes and practices of barrack residents
- Assess existing local and national government policies



Methods

- Literature search: Indonesian central government reconstruction board (BRR) policy, existing research, inter-agency coordination meetings, and monitoring reports from temporary barracks in Aceh Province.
- Agency discussions
- Barrack Owners, Camat, and BRR interviews
- Household surveys in 15 barrack locations (25%)
- Drinking water samples tested using Bacteriological H2S Strips and Del Agua Kits.
- Community mapping exercises, observations and focus group discussions.










Hygiene Knowledge





Sanitation


- 40% of latrines unusable
- However, enough working to meet
 SPHERE standards
- Positive impact of NGOs active in barracks

DelAqua Kit





Water Quantity and Quality



- 0 Coliform Count per 100 ml (105 Households)
- 1-39 Coliform Count per 100 ml (39 Households)
- ☐ 40-200 Coliform Count per 100 ml (11 Households)
- > 200 Coliform Count per 100 ml (23 Households)



Barrack Decommissioning



51% of barrack residents did not know when their barrack would be taken down



Permanent Housing

Only 26% of households in our 15 barracks had housing commitments according to BRR records





Conclusions

- Increased policy team involvement
 - Encourage government maintenance strategy
 - Formalized barracks decommissioning plan
 - Inform residents where and when they are moving
- Targeted hygiene promotion
- Maintenance focus rather than new construction
