Cyber Threats

 Definition: Online material that raises concern about violence against others or self. May be direct threats or may allude to a threat of harm to self or others.

Impact of Cyber Threats

◆ 58% of kids admit someone has said mean or hurtful things to them online.

◆ 32% of all teens say they have been targets of potentially menacing online activities.

What are Cyber Tools?

- Internet
- Cell phones, including camera phones
- Text messages
- Blogs (V-blogs)
- Online video games
- Instant messaging, message boards
- Chat rooms
- Social networking groups
- ◆ Email, listservs
- File sharing

Teacher knowledge

Effective integration

 Local decision making (state guided/ locally decided)

Challenges and Barriers to Implementing a Statewide Policy

 Children's Internet Protection Act (CIPA)

 Perception of incidents happening outside of school purview

Data collection methodology

Key Strategies to Prevent Cyber Threats

 Link school safety and technology committees to conduct needs assessment

- Establish and update local policy
- Inform all stakeholders (students, staff, parents, community)

Key Strategies to Prevent Cyber Threats

- Engage youth as educators
- Integrate cyber tools as normative instructional strategies
- Establish confidential method to report incidents

Issues for Consideration

- Concerns with filters and blocking
 - False sense of security
 - Do not filter all inappropriate content
 - Do not prevent cyber bullying
 - May restrict access to educationally rich sites
 - Inherent bias of blocked content
 - Do not build student skills for safe navigation of the internet

Issues for Consideration

- Constitutional Issues
 - Monitoring and search of internet use records; Free speech
- ◆ Local/School Issues
 - Form situation review team
- Individual Issues
 - Create your own avatar

Change at a State Level – New York Example

- Review related efforts from other states
- Expand awareness of the problem
 - Sessions with state policy makers
 - Administrator professional development
 - Workshops for community organizations (56 cooperative extension offices and over 700 after school programs)
- End user survey (student focus groups)

Change at a State Level – New York Example

 Draft policy guidelines aligned with state and federal requirements

 Identify representative stakeholders for draft policy review and feedback

Change at a State Level – New York Example

 Engage selected schools for pilot implementation (rural, urban, suburban)

Revise based on feedback

Ongoing process
