

Women's Health


- Over half of diabetics are women
- Minorities are 2-4 times more likely to be diagnosed type 2 diabetes
- Obesity is a risk factor for diabetes, hypertension, and musculoskeletal problems

Campina-Bacote Cultural Competence Model (2007)





Interactive Virtual Patient Assignment

Students

- Access a history and picture reflective of the patient's current situation
- Receive a video taped report from the previous nursing shift
- Review chart orders
- Plan patient care indicated from information gathered
- Use threaded discussion to share plan of care with colleagues

Benefit of Interactive Virtual Patients

- Faculty can evaluate both process and presentation
- Repetitive interviews with a variety of patient scenarios
 - Improves ability to obtain accurate assessment data
 - Provides frequent opportunities for feedback from faculty
 - Increases proficiency in data collection and communication
