

# Use in Massachusetts 12-17 year old








### Use in Massachusetts 18-25 year old








# Use in Massachusetts 26+ year olds








## Alcohol Abuse and Dependence







### Legal and Legislative Issues



- Recent Legal Changes
  - -per se
  - -enhanced sanctions for repeat offenders
  - -primary seat belt
  - -"Rosie D" lawsuit
- Some movement
  - -alcohol taxes
  - -youth possession



### **Alcohol Taxes**



 Massachusetts ranks among the states with the lowest alcohol taxes – 12<sup>th</sup> overall

Not raised since 1976

 Direct correlation between youth binge drinking and alcohol taxes



### Select Consequence Data



- Alcohol still remains the primary drug reported among treatment admissions
- Alcohol-involved drivers in fatal crashes
- Alcohol-related fatal motor vehicle crashes
