






Child Health Linkages


MDG 1, 4 and 6: Health, HIV/AIDS and Nutrition

- 85% of diarrhoeal deaths are from poor hygiene practices, contaminated drinking water, poor sanitation
- reducing number of episodes of diarrhoea and worm infestations has impact on nutritional status
- New evidence linking hand-washing and ARI
- WASH linked to helminths, guinea worm, fluorosis, arsenicosis
- WASH important in home-based care in reducing opportunistic infections

Evidence base + costing = High Impact/Low Cost Interventions Quick Wins for Children!


Behaviour Change

- ➤Use of safe drinking water – point of use water treatment
- ➤ Use of toilets abandoning open defecation
- Hand washing with soap
- Safe disposal of young children's excreta

- Enabling
 Environments
 policy, upstream

Child Health Epidemiological Reference Group (CHERG)

- look for data on prevalence of risk/protective factors
- systematic reviews of impact of those factors on Global Burden of Disease
