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

- Includes multidisciplinary & multi-site team working at multiple levels to enhance HIV prevention for Kenyan youth in primary schools.



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
"Love Life, Talk and Live!"

Primary Objective:

To increase capacity of KEC-CS to support teachers in the implementation of the school-based curriculum on abstinence and behavior change

Elements of Program:

- Primary school ages 10-14
- Derived from evidence-based approaches to HIV prevention
- Incorporates African and Christian Values
- Provides HIV prevention and communication skills



Why use a multidisciplinary, collaborative team in international HIV prevention?

- Collaboration across a wide range of disciplines contributes to the creation of sustainable, culturallysensitive programs targeted to the unique needs and conditions of individual communities or countries.
- In international HIV prevention, multidisciplinary & collaborative team are especially beneficial given the complex nature of the epidemic.
- In order for programs to be sustainable, capacity building needs to occur at multiple levels and involve multiple disciplines.
