

SBIRT: Core Clinical Components

- Screening: Very brief screening that identifies substance-related problems
- Brief Intervention: Raises awareness of risks and motivation of client toward acknowledgment of problem
- Brief Treatment: Cognitive behavioral work with clients who acknowledge risks and are seeking help
- Referral: Referral of those with more serious addictions

- Referral to treatment provides those identified as needing more extensive treatment with access to speciality care.

A key aspect of SBIRT is the integration and coordination of screening and treatment components into a system of services. This system links a community's specialized treatment programs with a network of early intervention and referral activities that are conducted in medical and social service settings.

Is SBIRT Effective?

SBIRT research has shown that large numbers of individuals at risk of developing serious alcohol or other drug problems may be identified through primary care screening. Interventions such as SBIRT have been found to:

- Decrease the frequency and severity of drug and alcohol use,
- Reduce the risk of trauma, and
- Increase the percentage of natients who enter specialized substance

SBIRT Core Components

The theoretical framework and programmatic structure of SBIRT programs may vary, but the core components of SBIRT remain and can be defined as follows:

Screening

Incorporated into the normal routine in medical and other community settings, screening provides identification of individuals with problems related to alcohol and/or substance use. Screening can be through interview and self-report. Three of the most widely used screening instruments are AUDIT, ASSIST, and DAST.

Brief Intervention

Following a screening result indicating moderate risk, brief intervention is provided. This involves motivational discussion focused on raising individuals' awareness of their substance use and its consequences, and motivating them toward behavioral change. Successful brief intervention encompasses support of the client's empowerment to make behavioral change.

Brief Treatment

Following a screening result of moderate to high risk, brief treatment is provided. Much like brief intervention, this involves motivational discussion and client empowerment. Brief Treatment, however, is more comprehensive and includes assessment, education, problem solving, coping mechanisms, and building a supportive social environment.

Referral To Treatment

Following a screening result of severe or dependence, a referral to treatment is provided. This is a proactive process that facilitates access to care for those individuals requiring more extensive treatment than SBIRT provides. This is an imperative component of the SBIRT initiative as it ensures access to the appropriate level of care for all who are screened.

Referral to Treatment

Referral to specialized treatment is provided to those identified as needing more extensive treatment than offered by the SBIRT program. The effectiveness of the referral process to specialty treatment is a strong measure of SBIRT success and involves a proactive and collaborative effort between SBIRT providers and those providing specialty treatment to ensure access to the appropriate level of care.



Program Description

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), Center for Substance Abuse Treatment (CSAT) is funding Connections SBIRT—developed by Cook Inlet Tribal Council (CITC) in partnership with the Southcentral Foundation (SCF)—\$1.672 million per year for 5 years to provide screening, referral, brief intervention, and treatment services for adults and adolescents in primary health care settings and generalist community settings in Anchorage, Alaska.

Program Model

Screening

Conducted by specialists using the AUDIT and one drug use question.

Brief Intervention

Consists of minimally two or maximum of five 15-minute sessions (occurring once



Recent Website Development



Recent development has focused on:

- College and university health screening practice
- Online training for incorporating an SBIRT program into a trauma care setting



Future Website Development



Future web development will focus on:

- Audience expansion such as implementing SBIRT programs into a variety of health care settings
- Content enhancement such as sustainability strategies
- E-Learning technology to train clinicians on how to provide SBIRT to a patient



Future architecture

Future Design

In tandem with the reorganization of the architecture, a revised look and feel is under consideration including a homepage that offers:

- Audience-specific portals to content

- Links to the latest news and research

- A single, comprehensive repository of SBIRT information to promote screening and brief intervention practice.
- Includes information such as training manuals, online resources, links to organizations and publications, and a list of references.
- For grantees, there are portals for grants management, technical assistance and government reporting requirements (such as GPRA).
- Rapidly moving in new directions including audience expansion and content enhancement.
