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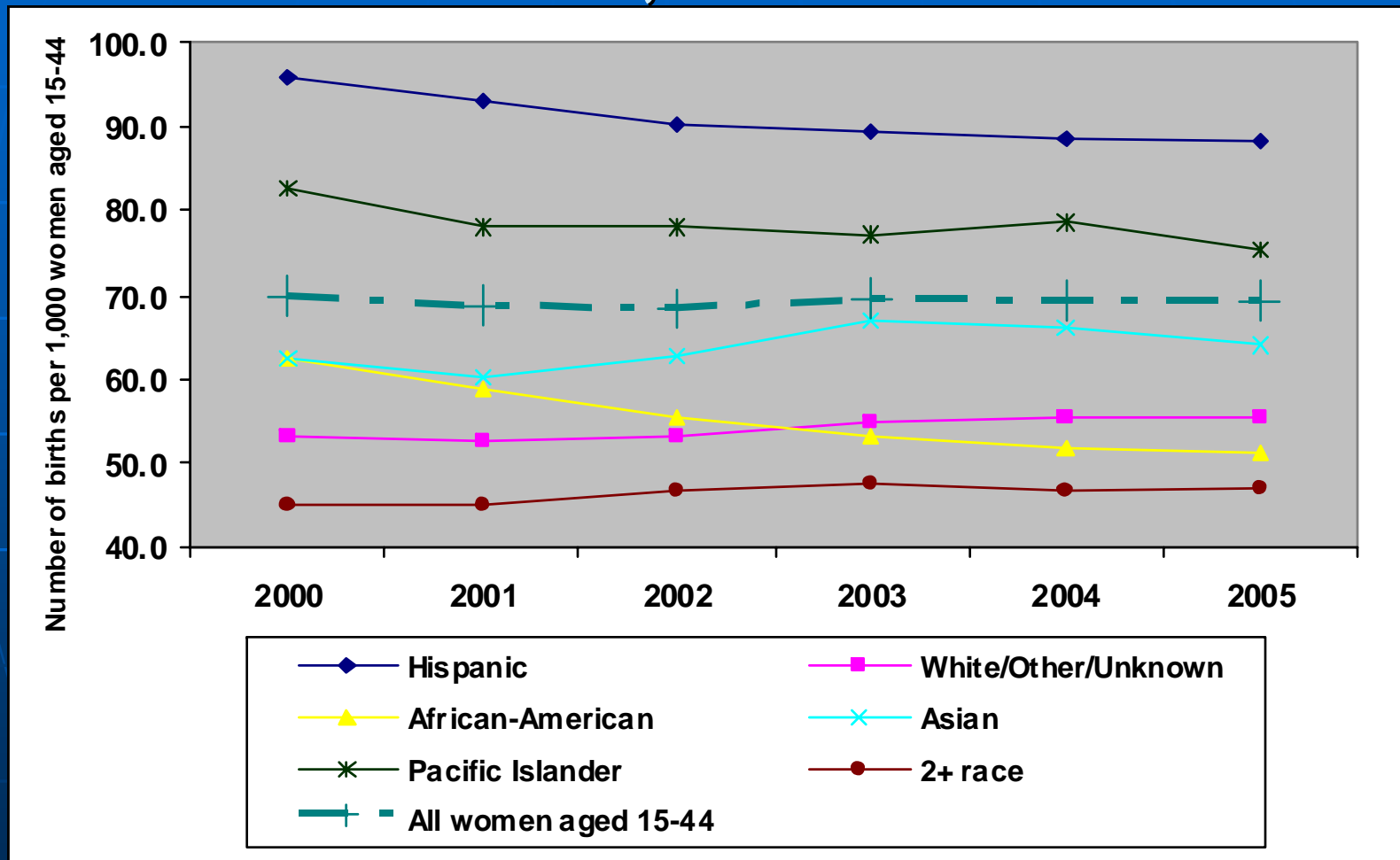
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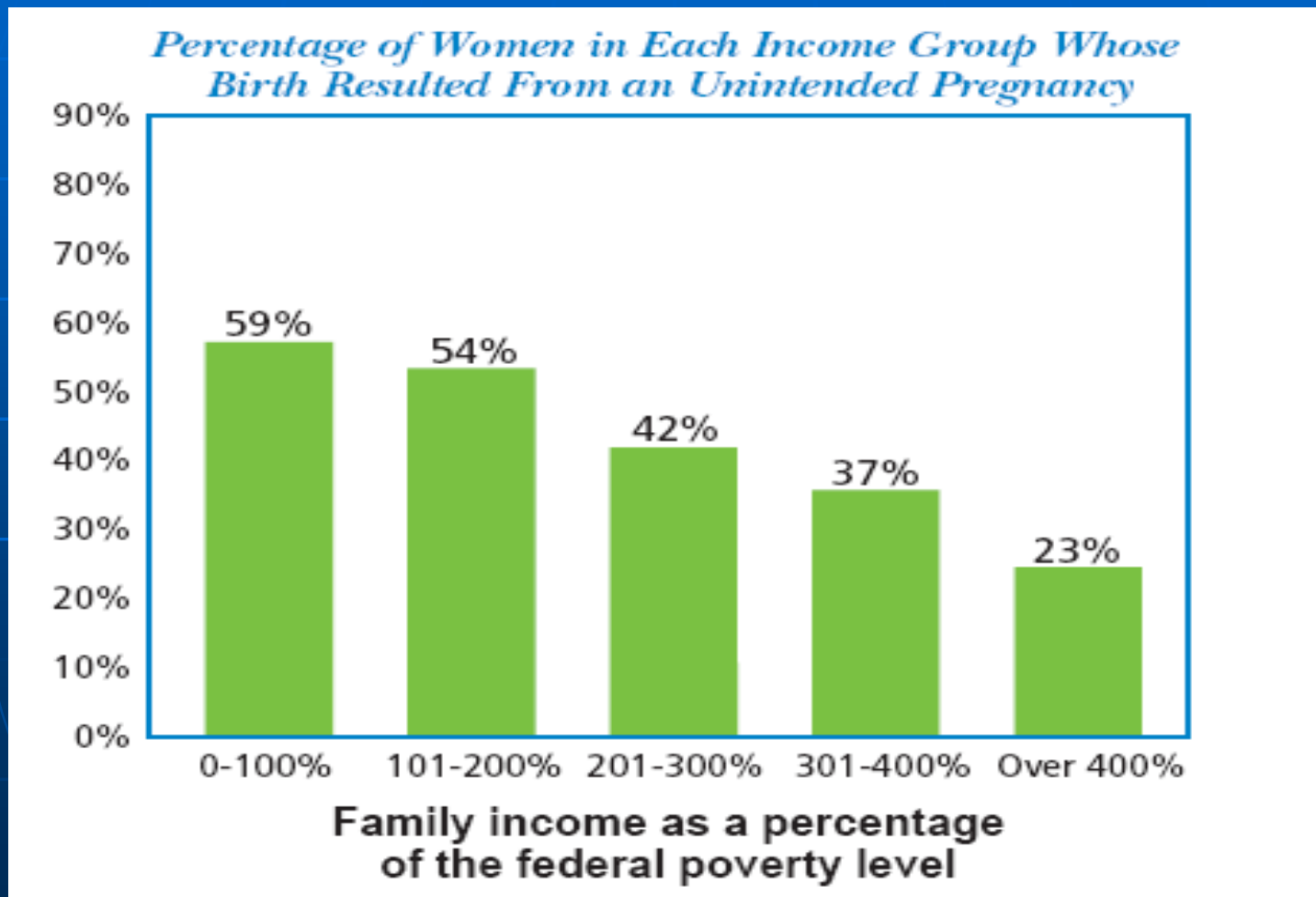

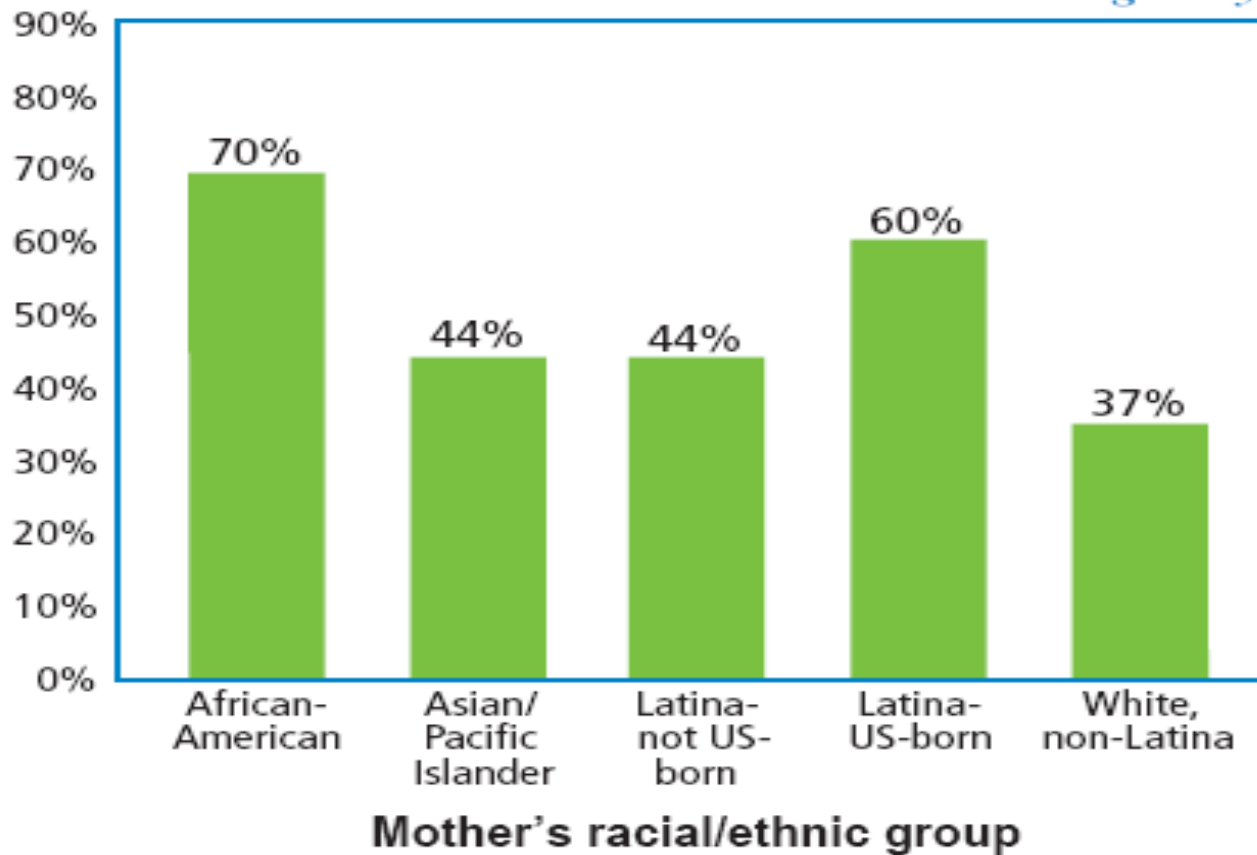
Unintended Pregnancy by Income, 2002

Family Planning, Access, Care, and Treatment (PACT) Program

- Established by the California legislature in 1996
- State and federally funded
- Purpose is to provide family planning and reproductive health services at no cost to California's low income residents of reproductive age.

Providing Access to Family Planning Services through

- Extensive provider network, consisting of public and private providers
- Medicaid providers enroll in Family PACT
- Provide services at no cost to clients
- Point-of-service enrollment
- Provider bills Family PACT on a fee-for-service basis

What is Family PACT ?

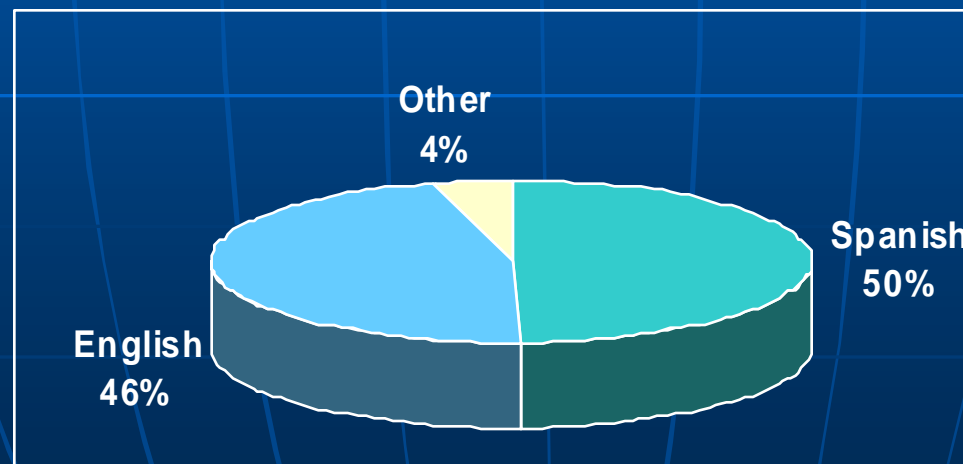
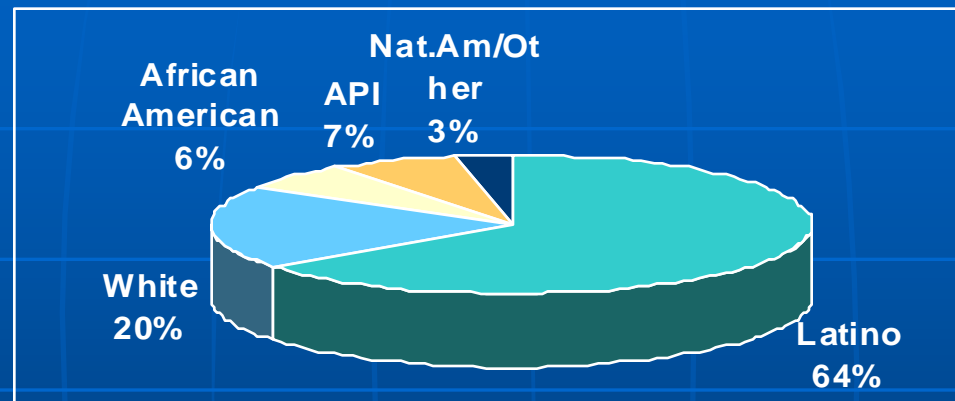
Family PACT is a “limited benefit health plan”

- Beneficiaries are distinct from Medi-Cal (Medicaid California)
- Distinct provider network
- Defined benefit structure
- Member relations, provider relations, claims analyses

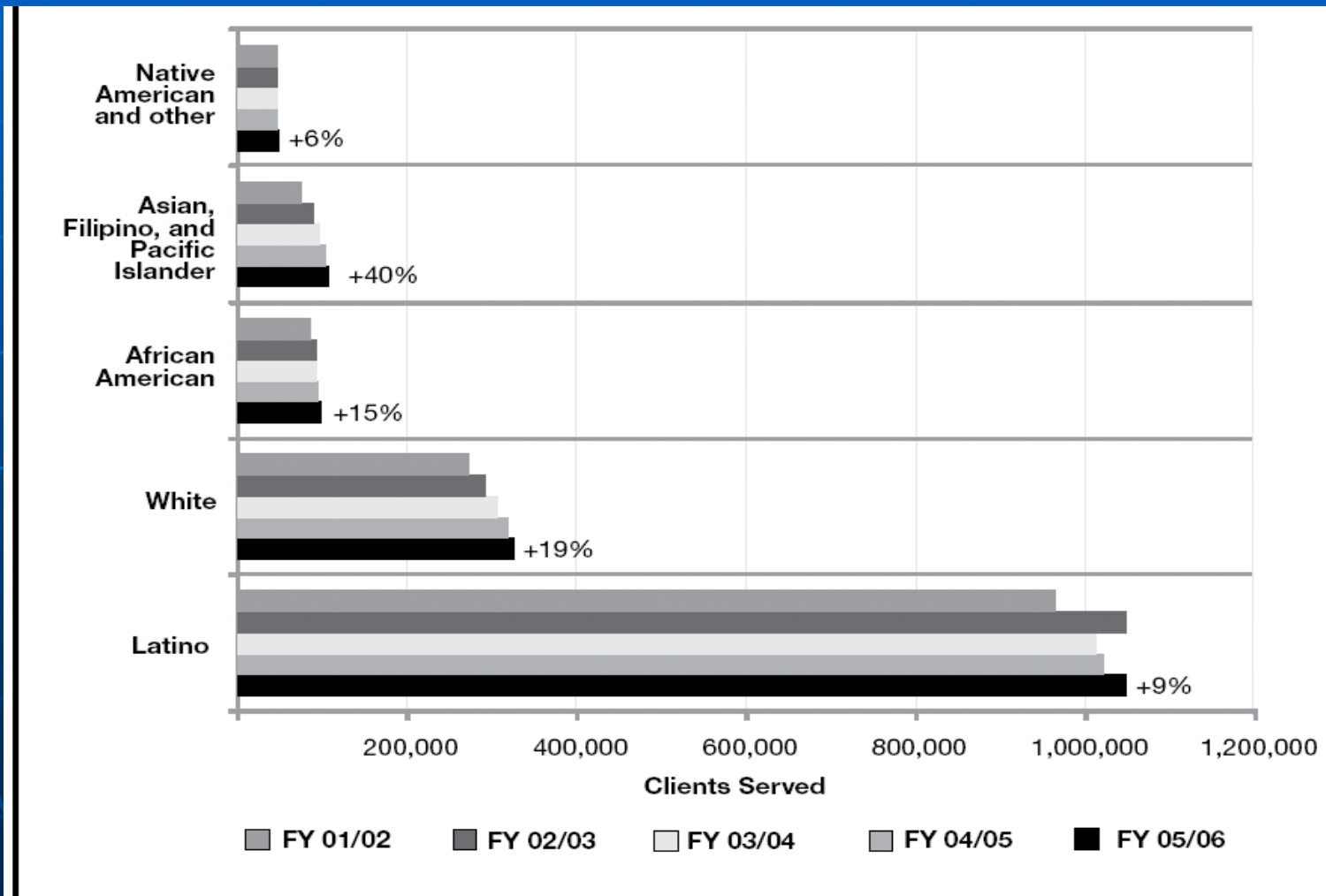
Most recent program data (05/06)

- Annual program costs: \$426 mill.
- Number of clients: 1.62 mill.
Of those 11% male and 19% adolescents
- Enrolled providers: 2,110 providers
(clinics, health centers, group and solo practices)

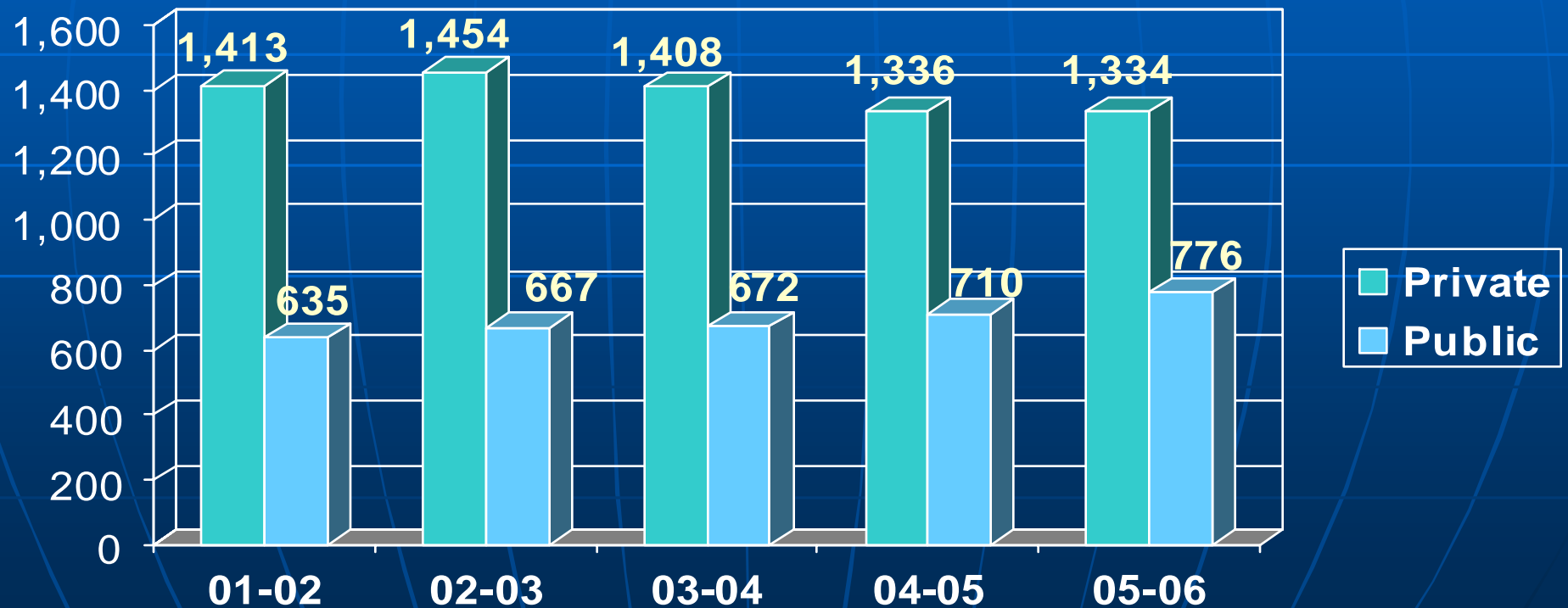
Clients Served by Race/Ethnicity and Primary Language FY 05-06

Trend in the Number of Enrolled Clinician Providers Delivering Family PACT Services by Provider Type

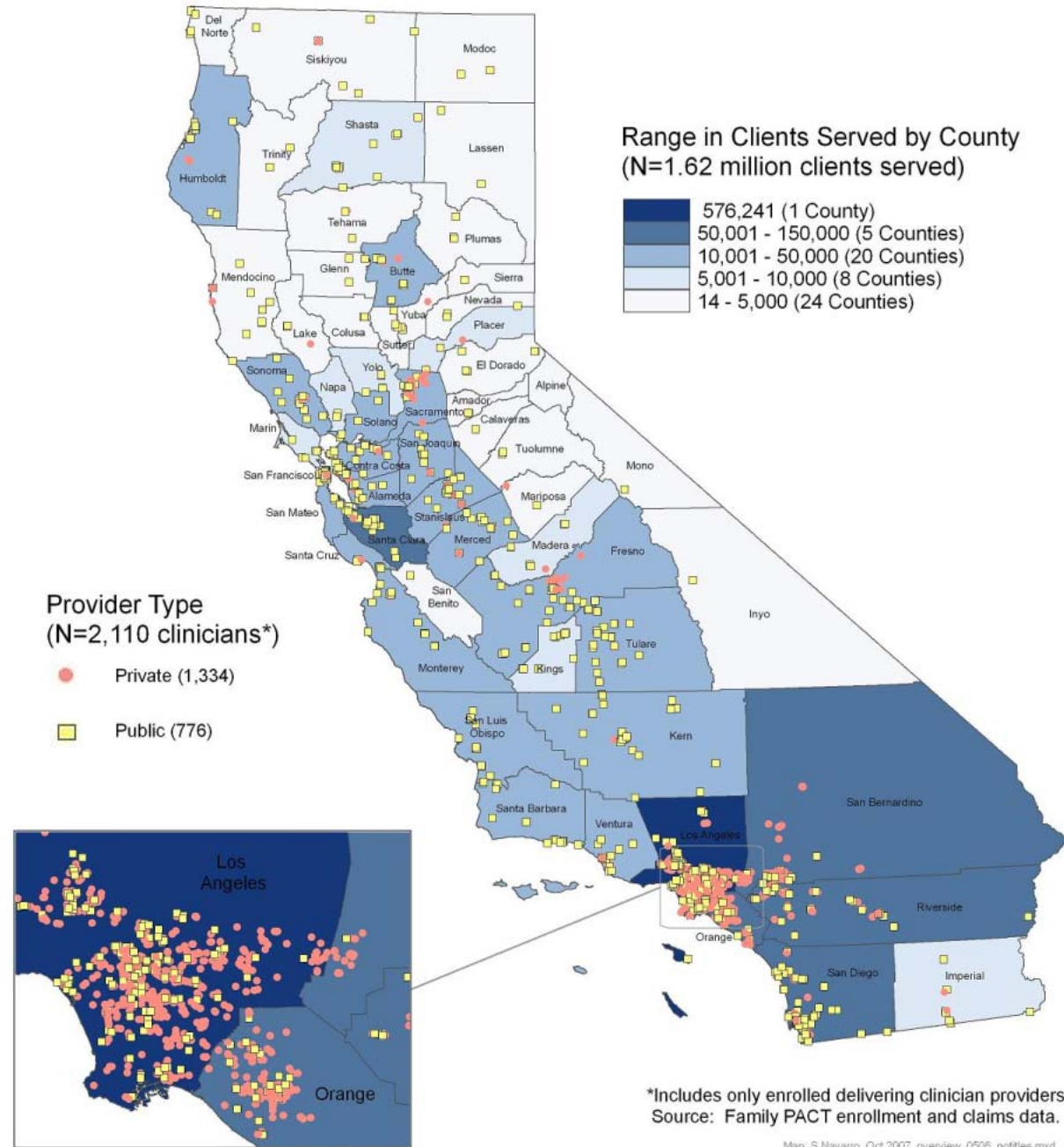


In FY 05-06, 2,100 enrolled clinician providers delivered Family PACT services.

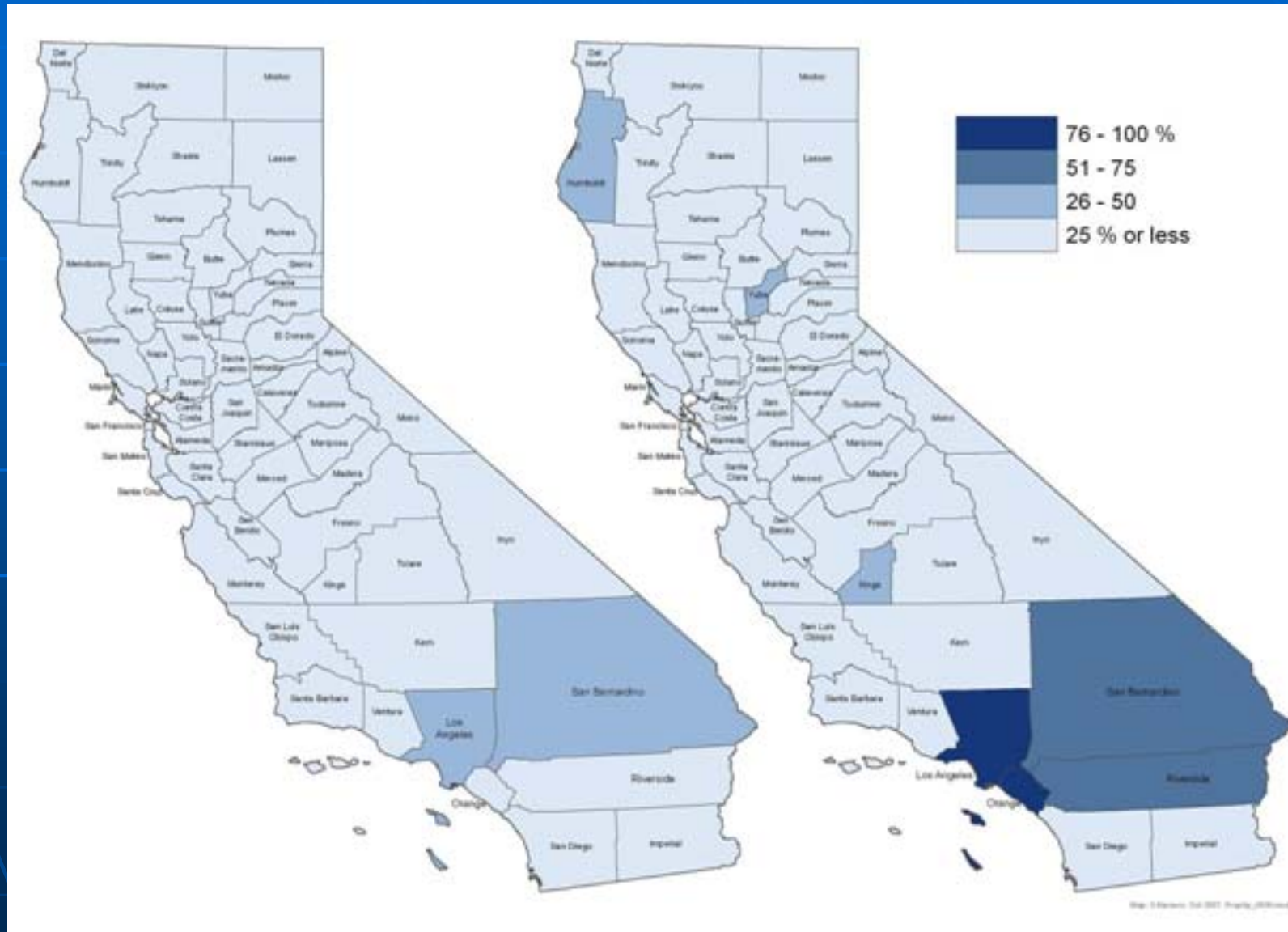

Conclusions

- The Family PACT program serves a large and diverse population.
- Clients' ability to choose the type of provider has been a key factor in its wide acceptability.
- Private providers tend to the needs of clients with Spanish as primary language. This impact is particularly large in Southern California (Los Angeles, San Bernadino and Riverside counties)
