Efforts

- CMHS will award grants to eight communities within the Children's Mental Health Initiative (CMHI) that demonstrate on applications a history or welldeveloped plans to address children and families of veterans regarding mental health issues.
- CMHS Federal Project Officers for the Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) Program monitors State service providers to ensure that they maintain a solid capacity and commitment to serve Veterans and ensure that clinicians are aware that mental health issues such as Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, anxiety disorders, and clinical depression, often compounded by co-morbid substance abuse, are issues that are often directly related to the individual Veteran's homelessness.
- CMHS annual PATH Grant Request for Applications (RFA) provides language to all State provider agency, asking them to describe how special consideration is given in awarding PATH funds to entities with a demonstrated effectiveness in serving homeless veterans.

Efforts cont'

- CMHS has had on-going participation in the Consumer Council of the Veterans Administration's Serious Mental Illness Committee. This has included consultation on the following:
 - addressing stigma
 - developing self-help approaches
 - promoting the concept of recovery
- CMHS' Statewide Family Network Program, which provides information, education, and support to families with children who have serious mental health challenges, has grantees who have been using their grant funds to provide outreach and support efforts specifically to families where there is a family member serving in the military and the children are experiencing mental health issues.
