## Pharmacy Access Partnership and the California Family Health Council launched the CA EC Network in May 2006 to:

- Improve EC access and awareness to prevent unplanned pregnancy
- Bolster women's decision-making authority to use EC
- Mainstream EC access to use universal access as a bridge to ongoing healthcare
- Support women's reproductive right, privacy and ability to choose the best contraceptive option for them
- Impress upon policymakers, opinion leaders, and media professionals the importance of broad EC access

### Implications of the August 2006 FDA Plan B over-the-counter (OTC) decision:

Although many viewed the FDA's approval of Plan B EC as an OTC product for consumers 18 and older as an advance for reproductive health access, barriers remain for young women, low-income women and those without proof of age, who must still obtain a prescription for Plan B (most state-funded health insurance programs still require a prescription for Plan B).

#### The EC Network bolstered CA and national advocacy efforts to respond to the EC OTC guidelines through:

#### Collaboration



- · Focus on key issues: access for low-income women and youth
- · Hold semi-annual meetings and strategic planning
- Facilitate joint projects

#### Media Cultivation



- Establish policy positions
- Hold press events
- Develop strategic messaging

### Education & Outreach



- Centralize info on website
- Provide community and practitioner education
- Distribute information resources

#### **Accomplishments**

- Coalition-building across diverse fields of interest
- Strategizing for policy change (i.e. OTC decision)
- Generating EC news in local papers, television

#### **Challenges**

- Limited resources, including funding and time
- · Difficult to avoid duplication of member efforts
- · Shifted focus on EC since FDA OTC decision

#### Moving Forward...

- Seek dedicated funding
- Continue focus on networking vs. activities
- · Conduct "State of EC in CA" research paper (if funded)

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
