What Will Be Required to Maintain My CPH Status?

CPH professionals are required to obtain and document 50 hours of continuing education every two years.

Additionally, CPH

professionals will be



required to complete a re-assessment experience every 10 years.

Where Can I Get Certified?

You can take the exam at one of the 300 testing centers across the country or at a center outside of the US. Candidates that sign up early will have preferred choice of location.



What Do I Need to Know?

The exam consists of 200 questions that test a candidate's knowledge of the five core areas of public health and seven cross-cutting competencies in public health.

Five Core Areas:

- Biostatistics
- Environmental Health Science
- Epidemiology
- Health Policy and Management
- Social and Behavioral Sciences

Seven Cross-Cutting Competencies:

- Communication and Informatics
- Diversity and Culture
- Leadership
- Public Health Biology
- Professionalism
- Program Planning
- Systems Thinking
