Research Questions


- Designed a study to examine what empowerment means to development organizations:





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












Four Types of Empowerment

- Natural Resource: ability to access, share, conserve and effective use natural resources (e.g. food security, water management)
- Economic: ability to achieve financial security & selfsufficiency in order to meet needs and improve quality of life (e.g. market access, microfinance)
- Political: ability to access govt/social services, demand accountability, organize for self-government and advocacy (e.g. "town hall meeting" forums)
- Health: ability to make decisions regarding, seek and receive care; care is physically, financially and culturally accessible

Natural Resource Empowerment

"[Communities] were empowered to make decisions about resource allocation...through the involvement of traditional, municipal and community representatives...From their engagement in formal dialogue, concrete initiatives...related to farming and pastoral practice were agreed upon... proposals to current law were made to the national secretariat... [and] critical networking and relationship building [occurred] among groups that had formerly been in conflict."

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


Health Empowerment


Programs "train community health workers [who] mobilize their neighbors to practice good hand-washing, careful control of drinking water, etc" to combat a cholera outbreak.



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Implications for Community-Based Planning & Services

- Community empowerment model offers a template for community-based programs
- Agencies can promote & facilitate mechanisms to enable communities to take leadership role in...
 - Priority setting, planning, and interacting with agencies
 - Advocating for access, accountability and services from government
 - Organizing for self-governance, resource allocation and provision of services
- Promoting community empowerment in one sphere can lead to empowerment in other spheres
