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Background

- · Need for evaluation training
 - Programs lacking evaluation for effectiveness
 - Difficult market for grant funding
 - 21% (23/108) of members of the Violence Prevention Coalition of Greater Los Angeles reported that they would like to increase their competency in program evaluation
- SCIPRC/VPC collaboration

Population Description

- 69% (54/78) response rate for follow-up
- Mean age: 44, range: 23 to 67
- 69% Female
- Race Ethnicity:
 - 33% African American
 - 29% White
 - 27% Latino or Hispanic
 - 12% Asian or Asian American
 - -6% other

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Population Description

- Organizations served populations located in all major regions of Los Angeles County
 - high-risk youth, victims of violence, gang members, homeless persons
- Provided a variety of services:
 - education, after-school programs, shelter, gang intervention, advocacy

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Outcomes

- From July 2007 through March 2009:
 - 78 individuals from 42 unduplicated community-based organizations participated
 - -11 workshop series were conducted
 - -5-11 participants attended each workshop

Evaluation of Programs: Individual Level

- 67% (36/54) are using the information and materials to evaluate their programs <u>at least monthly</u>
- 46% (25/54) have developed an evaluation plan since completing workshops
- 48% (26/54) have not developed an evaluation plan, but intend to do so

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Preparing Grant Proposals

- 53% (28/54) reported that information provided in the workshops helped them prepare a grant proposal
- Of the 28:
 - 11 proposals were fully or partially funded
 - 15 proposals were still in process
 - 2 proposals were declined
- 68% (19/28) used the information and materials <u>at</u> <u>least monthly</u> to write grant proposals

Dissemination and Collaboration

- Referrals
 - 77% (39/53) recommended workshop to a total of 189 other individuals
- · Sharing of Information
 - 74% (41/53) shared information and materials from the workshop with a total of 182 other individuals
- VPC Membership
 - 10 organizations joined VPC after attending
 - 14 organizations plan to join the VPC

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Conclusions

- This study highlights the effectiveness of a multiday training on program evaluation among community-based organizations who are engaged in violence prevention work
- To date, 65 organizations have completed the training and more remain on the waiting list
- The high level of interest in the workshops and the findings from this study may be of interest to:
