


# **Introduction**


- **Probationers:** Offenders placed on community supervision in lieu of incarceration by courts.
- **Parolees:** Adults conditionally released to community supervision by parolee board decision or by mandatory conditional release after prison term.
- U.S. 2007: 987,427 female probationers 98,923 female parolees
- Mississippi Female: 2007: 5,052 probationers, 427 parolees 2009: 5,324 probationers, 601 parolees
- High re-arrest rates associated with low employment and income. (Freudenberg et al., 2005).
- Parolees who attended a clinic following release from prison were 37 percent less likely to be returned to prison within 12 months than were parolees who did not attend (Farabee, 2006).
- Successful reentry and reintegration requires mental health services (Golembeski & Fullilove, 2005; Solomon et al., 2004).

## Purpose:

This study examines mental health services utilization and successful reentry and reintegration relationships among female probationers and parolees in Mississippi

# **Methods**

- Non probability, convenience sampling of 667 female probationers and parolees
- I.R.B. approvals obtained from Mississippi State Department of Health and Department of Corrections.
- Surveys distributed by Mississippi Department of Corrections (MDOC) Probation/Parole Officers during reporting in compliance with court orders.
- Mental health services utilization analyzed with current employment and income using SPSS<sup>™</sup> 17.0.

## Tool and Data Collection

- Background Information
- Family Background
- Drug and/or Alcohol Use
- Assessment (resources, treatment programs)
- Self-Administered Questionnaire completed and mailed to Researchers

## Data Analyses

- Crosstabs with frequency distribution and Chi-Square analysis
- Binary Logistic Regression Analysis
