Practice Analysis of Chiropractic 2010

A project report, survey analysis and summary of the practice of chiropractic within the United States



Practice Analysis of Chiropractic

- First conducted in 1991 and reported in 1993
- Conducted and reported every 5 years
- Serves as the justification and validation of what is tested in the Part III and Part IV examinations
- Provides legislators, insurance representatives, educators, and the general public with an overview of chiropractic's importance and effectiveness as a healthcare profession

Planning and Development

STEERING COMMITTEE

Comprised of members of the Board of Directors of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners

ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Twenty-four member committee with national representation



Planning and Development

THREE-DAY WORKSHOP

- Guided the design of the survey instrument
- Identified the professional functions performed by licensed chiropractors
- Documented the "best practices" methods of completing the tasks



Planning and Development

THREE-DAY WORKSHOP

- · Identified the most critical tasks
- Developed objectives to be used as the foundation of the NBCE Parts III and IV tests
- · Approved final practice role description

Administration

- Identified 74,045 chiropractors on lists provided by 50 states and the District of Columbia
- Mailed 9,839 surveys to chiropractors
- Received 2,271 completed surveys from full-time chiropractors



Administration

- The completed surveys received and other information obtained accounted for 39% of the surveys mailed
- Conducted a second survey of 100 nonrespondents to confirm the validity of the survey results



2010 Report Contents

1. The Chiropractic Profession

Addresses personal, educational, and professional criteria individuals meet to become *licensed* practitioners of chiropractic

2. Chiropractic Research

Presents literature documenting the efficacy of chiropractic health care



2010 Report Contents

3. Standards for Occupational Performance

Presents general information concerning licensure and certification testing

Expresses some legal considerations that shape regulatory agency requirements

4. Planning and Developing the Survey of Chiropractic Practice

Describes the organization, development, and research protocols of the report



2010 Report Contents

5. Administering the Survey of Chiropractic Practice

Describes the methods and factors used in compiling the mailing list, tracking all components, tabulating the data, and encouraging a high rate of response

6. Overview of Survey Responses

Summarizes the conditions, treatments, and professional activities within chiropractic practice



2010 Report Contents

7. The Chiropractic Practitioner

Presents the characteristics of the "typical" chiropractic practitioner

8. Patient Conditions

Describes the "typical" chiropractic patient, patient conditions and chiropractic management of those conditions indicated by the survey response data



2010 Report Contents

9. Professional Functions and Treatment Procedures

Summarizes the response data relative to professional functions, knowledge, and treatment procedures performed by the respondents



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- The proportion of chiropractors who have a bachelor's, master's, or a PhD degree has risen steadily from 53.7% in 1991 to 74.8% in 2009
- The typical practitioner now spends more than a quarter (25.2%) of his or her work time documenting patient care; this amount has almost doubled since 1998 (13.8%)



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- Virtually all chiropractors provide health promotion and wellness care
- The percentage of patients under 17 years of age has increased 7.4%, and the percentage of patients 65 years of age and over has increased 2.1% since the 1991 survey



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- The portion of chiropractors practicing for more than 15 years has been steadily increasing from one-quarter (24.6%) in 1991 to more than half (51.1%) in 2009
- A decreasing proportion of chiropractors work more than 50 hours weekly – 10.2% in 1991 and 4.9% in 2009



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- A typical doctor of chiropractic makes 13.6 referrals per month to other healthcare providers and receives 7.7 referrals per month from other practitioners
- The percentage of female doctors of chiropractic has increased approximately 10% from 13.3% in 1991 to 22.4% in 2009



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- The proportion of chiropractors reporting Caucasian ethnicity has decreased 10% - from 95.5% in 1991 to 84.9% in 2009
- One in twenty (4.4%) chiropractors responding to the 2009 survey reported that they were employed under contract to provide chiropractic care to active or retired military personnel



Trends in Chiropractic Practice 1991 - 2009

- One in six (15.9%) chiropractors reporting in 2009 described their practice location as a rural small town or a rural area
- Almost half (47.9%) of chiropractors reporting in 2009 had completed associate-ship training, compared to about a third (32.6%) in 1991
