Certification is a Response to Language Access Requirements

- Title VI of the Civil Rights Act and the corresponding DHHS Guidance
- National CLAS Standards mandate providers ensure <u>meaningful</u> access to health care for patients with limited English proficiency

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depends on competency of interpreters

- DHHS Guidance: "Recipients should be aware that competency requires more than selfidentification as bilingual."
- CLAS Standard 7: "Ensure the competence of individuals providing language assistance..."



It is a multiple-choice, computer-based test in English which focuses on the role of the healthcare interpreter and measures the interpreter's knowledge, abilities and skills related to the following areas:

Value of the CoreCHI™ Certification


- Measures the core professional knowledge that distinguishes a healthcare interpreter from a bilingual, including knowledge of
 - safety precautions, universal protocols and HIPAA
 - working in health and health care various settings, e.g. health departments, hospitals, community outreach
- Measures critical thinking and ethical decision-making abilities that are vital for the interpreter as a member of the care team www.chiertification.org





3. Value of certified interpreters – competency assurance process, reduction in health disparities




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CCHI Certification Offers

- Consistency in assessing professional competencies of interpreters
- Validity of the assessment tool verified by a third-party – the National Commission for Certifying Agencies (of Institute for Credentialing Excellence)
- Workforce development by requiring interpreters to complete continuing education as a credential renewal requirement
