Year Four: BHDC Summer Internship 2013

In 2004, the Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health, in partnership with the SUNY Downstate Medical Center, and the Office of the Brooklyn Borough President created the Brooklyn Health Disparities Center to reduce health disparities among minorities and new immigrants in Brooklyn, New York through clinical and community based research, education, outreach and training. Through its community engagement core, the Center, funded by the National Institutes of Health – National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD) has implemented an engaging health disparities summer internship program for high school students for the past four years.

The Brooklyn Health Disparities Summer Internship Program (HDSIP) provides a community engaged health disparities summer course for students recruited from the Institute's Health Science Academy, a three-year after-school science enrichment program. In addition to didactic training on health disparities, students conduct research projects in collaboration with members of participating community-based organizations (CBOs).

Building on the success of the previous years, 17 teenagers participated, during the month of July 2013, in the 4-week Brooklyn based internship program, designed to engage minority youth while building the capacity of CBOs to conduct Community–Based Participatory Research (CBPR) on health equity issues. The students were placed at eight local community based organizations and performed research projects on various topics related to the social determinants of health, resulting in advocacy and policy recommendations for local decision makers. Their internship experience culminated with oral and poster presentations of their projects to local leaders and legislators at the Brooklyn Borough Hall.

In June 2013, I was awarded a Fulbright Research Specialist Fellowship to develop and implement a five-week summer internship program on climate change and public health in the Republic of Trinidad & Tobago. This program, conducted in collaboration with the University of the West Indies (UWI), Faculty of Science & Technology, builds upon an earlier Fulbright Fellowship, which was awarded to the Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health's CEO, Dr. Ruth C. Browne. Similar to the summer internship program in New York, the climate change and public health program in Trinidad & Tobago included community-based research projects conducted at local organizations. 18 students conducted seven research projects on the impact of the environment on public health. Their research findings were highlighted in oral and poster presentations at a closing ceremony held at the UWI in August 2013. This publication features the projects of both the US and Trinidad & Tobago based summer projects.



Their recommendations for improving health outcomes focused greatly on the need for increased awareness and strict policies that would empower individuals to be advocates for their health.





Trinidad & Tobago Summer Internship 2013

The Summer Internship Programme on Climate Change & Public Health introduced secondary school students to public health and climate change issues and tools needed to effect change, inspiring them to pursue a career in public health.

The Arthur Ashe Institute for Urban Health conducted this program in collaboration with the University of the West Indies, St. Augustine's Campus (Trinidad & Tobago). The Institute's successful Trinidad-based Social Determinants of Health Internship Programme for Caribbean Secondary Students, conducted in 2012, was adapted to focus on the impact of climate change on public health in Trinidad and Tobago. The collaborative program development process resulted in a five-week community engaged program to provide training, public health career exploration and community-based internships in local organizations for current or recent secondary school students. These students were exposed to activities related to the following:

- Information on health and climate change; risk management
- Public health surveillance and opportunities to use climate information
- Core concepts in public health and epidemiology
- Emergency preparedness
- Systems for surveillance and support and interagency cooperation
- Environmental justice

This internship culminated with presentations at a closing ceremony on August 16, 2013.






