



The Need is Here

Historically, families in central New Orleans have struggled to gain adequate access to medical care. Following Hurricane Katrina, the infrastructure to the community's medical resources was severely damaged. More than five years later, there are still substantial gaps in the access to affordable healthcare. There are no full-time primary care clinics within the area that offer discounted or free services for the uninsured.

Currently, there are more than 14,000 people living in the area: 27% of our target population is uninsured, and 53% of use the emergency room as their primary source of care. The population is less mobile than most, with a significant portion of the population using ambulances to travel for healthcare. Our population is also less healthy with a much higher incidence of chronic diseases than the state and national averages.
