Objectives

- Analyze data sharing role of public health nurses (schools)
- Identify challenges to adoption of electronic data collection and sharing among public health nurses
- Formulate one action towards moving public health nurses toward increased data sharing

<u>Purpose</u>

 Determine current use and skills of nurses working in the public domain; along with willingness to change related to EHRs and use of technology





<u>Method</u>

- Biennial online survey to school nurses
- Convenient, national sample
- Analyzed by employer (education, public health, health care system) and age




• N=6841 participated (44.1% 41-50 years)

Separate charting for each person (RN, LPN, aide, etc)	56.9% (3,729)	20.3% (1,332)	12.6% (826)	10.2% (872)
Information specific to student health only available to appropriate persons	80.9% (5,416)	15.7% (1,051)	2.5% (185)	0.9% (61)
Interoperability (ability to share data with other school or health systems)	38.4% (2,520)	31.3% (2,053)	23.4% (1,537)	6.8% (445)
Ability to develop Individualized Health Plans within system	54.3% (3,634)	29.6% (1,984)	15.3% (1,021)	0.8% (56)

Current Practice

• Data Management: 86.8% top 5 activity

- only 20.1% wish it was

- Research: 90.8% would like to
 - (9.9% currently)





Association of School Nurses

Training Needs

- Not ranked in the top 5
 - #18 Technology (ipads, tablets, apps) (14.1%)
 - #20 Data collection/electronic health records (13.2%)
- 27.2% want local expert technology resource nurse (ranked 4th)







Qualitative Remarks

- Many expressed willingness to change, but faced challenges: lack of proper technology and training.
- Some reported having to initiate software training.
- Many expressed apprehension in asking for training or needed reports from vendors.



Discussion

- Follow up study for further understanding of needs, and readiness to use EHRs
- Ensure public and school health included in EHR discussions (interoperability)
- Investigate technology to communicate with parents





Conclusion

- **Role:** School Nurses are a source of rich data for school and community
- **Challenges:** Lack of understanding, need for training
- Action: Further training on advocating for health specific EHR, using technology, and using the data
