

BACKGROUND

Jera Mixed Secondary School is located in Siaya County of Nyanza Province in Kenya. The adolescent pregnancy rate in Nyanza are the highest in the country, at 27%. In 2012, Jera had two girls die from an unsafe

abortion and each year sees four pregnancies on average. About 800 students attend the school.



SIGNIFICANCE & AIM

GABS is a program designed to:

- Reduce female secondary school dropout rates due to pregnancy
- Decrease maternal mortality from unsafe abortions
- Increase education about sexual and reproductive health among secondary school students through a peer

This project aimed to perform a situation analysis in order to solicit funds for the continued development of the program.

ACTIVITIES

Led Focus Group Discussions

for parents of students and students themselves about their perspectives of the problem of adolescent pregnancy in the community.

Conducted Key Informant Interviews

with six student leaders, three teachers, and one administrator, to understand the impact and gaps of the program so far.

Surveyed Students for Baseline Knowledge

about sexual and reproductive health. Questions addressed both content and procedural knowledge. 100 students participated.

Designed and Implemented Peer-Education Modules

in conjunction with the educators. We visited two primary schools to share the lesson.

Held "Anonymous" Reproductive Health Education Sessions For the students not included in the programing.





RESULTS

Name as many methods as you can to prevent pregnancy (n=100)

The survey demonstrated many knowledge gaps. A sample from the responses is shown in the figure to the left.

Key Themes from Qualitative Data:

- Parents believe it is the schools' responsibility to educate their children about sexual and reproductive health.
- Teachers and administrators feel illequipped to disseminate such information.
- Many community members and students believe that making contraception available will increase risky sexual behaviors.
- Peer educators have passion for sharing this knowledge but lack the capacity to design and implement the program alone.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The situation analysis indicated a clear need for continued intervention in this region. With more funding, the program hopes to:

 Create a monthly structure for the club
Design activities that incorporate parents
Have a full time staff member to guide development.
